UNINTENDED TREE TRIMMING IN AUGUST

Early in August when there was but one person home, a cottonwood branch, looking remarkably like an entire tree, broke off landing on one end of our flight cage. Fortunately the pipe and telephone pole structure held up but not without serious damage. The wire, despite being heavy gauge, buckled, bent and tore in several places. The newly renovated roof was a shambles. No hawks were hurt but once the dust settled, they flew over to inspect the damage. A seam in the wire had been torn in two, providing a small opening. At least two hawks made good their escape before a ladder could be put in place and a make-shift "plug" used to block the opening. The birds seemed to line up to wait their turn to scoot through the hole. We immediately moved all the birds to a few alternate enclosures including one of our hunting cages. It will take some time to make the repairs on the large flight cage, so our release schedule will be delayed by weeks as a result.




Where the limb broke off

Bent pipe and twisted wire remains










ANNOUNCEMENTS
